TOPIC

During the last two decades, the question of "the other" and "otherness" has been intensively discussed in philosophy, sociology, psychoanalysis and Jewish studies. In this connection, three ways of looking at this field have turned out to be especially fruitful: [1] the concept of recognition (rooted in Hegel), [2] the concept of "the other" (rooted in Husserl and Buber), both of which have also been addressed by feminist social philosophy and have led to a paradigm shift in psychoanalysis and in childhood psychology and [3] the anthropological and pragmatic concept of action (rooted in Mead). In addition, the problem of whether our basic social relations are to be understood as symmetrical, asymmetrical, or as a combination of both have led to alternative concepts of justice and the socio-political framework. This First Workshop in Social and Political Thought at Michigan State University will discuss new directions of understanding what is probably one of the most fundamental concepts of human life and its social organization.



DRIVING DIRECTIONS

From Traverse City or Points North via I-75

Proceed south on I-75 to US-127 near Grayling. Proceed south on US-127 to East Lansing. Take the Trowbridge Road exit. Follow Trowbridge Road east to Michigan State University.

From Detroit or Points East via I-96

From Jackson or Points South via US-127


Proceed north on US-127 to East Lansing. Take the Trowbridge Road exit. Follow Trowbridge Road east to Michigan State University.

Area airports are in Lansing, Detroit and Flint.


AMTRAK

East Lansing and Jackson have AMTRAK-stations.


REGIONAL MAP
